

## WILDLIFE ARE ACTIVE IN THIS AREA BE WILD AWARE!

Utah is home to many species of wildlife, including: cougars, coyotes, elk, moose, mule deer, raptors and snakes.

To avoid conflicts with wildlife, and enjoy your outdoor experience, please follow these tips:

- Do not approach or feed wild animals. Keep your distance.
- Do not litter.
- Keep dogs leashed and under control at all times.
- Do not allow your dogs to chase or "play" with wildlife.
- Let wildlife know you are in the area by talking loudly, whistling and making noise.
- Stay away from animal carcasses.
- Be extra cautious in the spring when wildlife are raising young and in the fall when deer, elk and moose are in "rut" or breeding.
- Deer, elk and moose begin their annual migration into the valleys in early winter. Naturally, predators like cougars will follow their prey.
- Do not let dogs get near porcupines. Their quills are barbed and can embed in the skin. Consult a veterinarian to have the quills removed from the dog.
- Never try to poke, handle, corner or harass a snake.
- Rattlesnakes: if you hear a rattle, don't jump or panic. Try to locate where the sound is coming from before trying to move. Warn others if they are around.
- If approached by a wild animal, stay calm; pick up small pets and children. Make yourself look as large as possible; yell, wave your arms and throw rocks or sticks if necessary to frighten the animal away.
- Do not run or turn your back to the animal. Back away slowly.
- If attacked, fight back.

It is against Utah law to allow dogs to harass wildlife.
