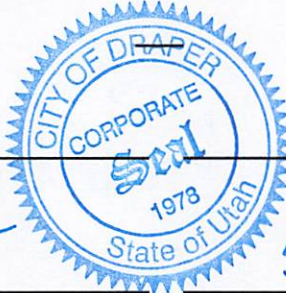

INTRODUCTION

Over 600 of Utah's communities have been classified as "at risk" of wildfire. The safety of the citizens of any community and the protection of private property and community infrastructure is a shared responsibility between the citizens; the owner, developer or association; and the local, county, state and federal governments. **The primary responsibility, however, remains with the local government and the citizen/property owner.**

The purpose of wildfire protection planning is to...

- Motivate and empower local government, communities, and property owners to organize, plan, and take action on issues impacting the safety and resilience of values at risk
- Enhance levels of fire and smoke resilience and protection to the communities and infrastructure
- Identify the threat of wildland fires in the area
- Identify strategies to reduce the risks to structures, infrastructure and commerce in the community during a wildfire
- Identify wildfire hazards, education, and mitigation actions needed to reduce risk
- Transfer practical knowledge through collaboration between stakeholders toward common goals and objectives

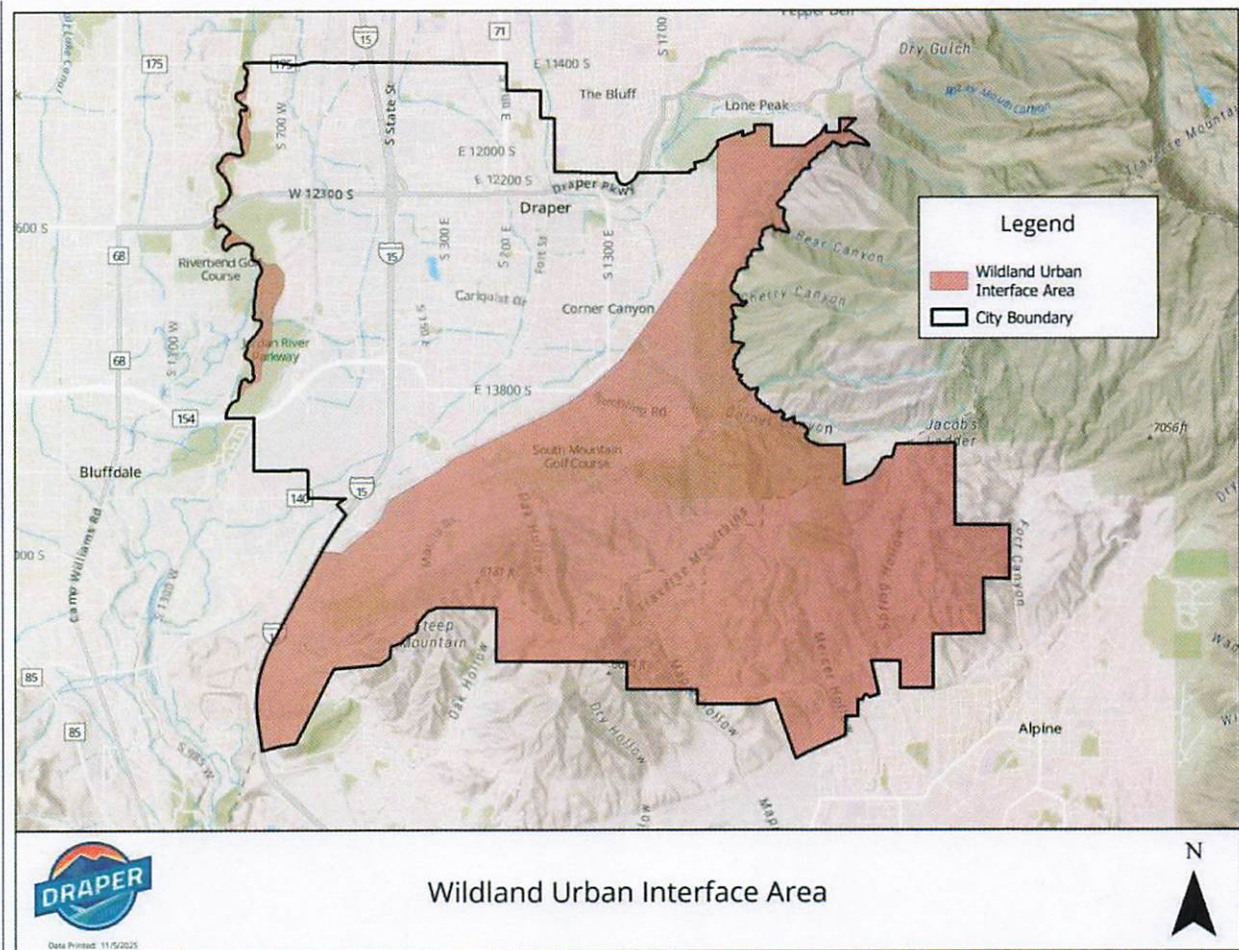

PART I COMMUNITY DESCRIPTION

Community Attributes
Location of Community Draper City is located in northern Utah along the southern edge of the Salt Lake Valley. It lies at the base of the Wasatch Mountain Range, approximately 20 miles south of downtown Salt Lake City, and spans portions of both Salt Lake and Utah counties. The city is bordered by Sandy to the north, Bluffdale and Riverton to the west, Lehi to the south, and the Wasatch Mountains to the east.
Roads, Bridges, Gates, and Culvert Conditions <i>List problem areas and consider labeling them on an attached map.</i> All road construction within Draper City meets applicable code requirements, thereby minimizing roadway deficiencies. However, seasonal conditions—particularly during winter weather—can affect accessibility. During periods of inclement weather, the use of snow tires and other appropriate vehicle capabilities is advised. Roads are maintained and cleared year round. <i>Are there at least two separate ways out of the community? Are roads properly marked with signs and are those signs metal and reflective? Are roads only seasonally accessible? Are there dead ends? Is there space available to turn emergency equipment around? Also examine the condition of the vegetation along the roads to improve evacuation needs.</i> The community has at least two separate means of egress. All paved roads are marked with metal, reflective signage, and most dead-end roads provide adequate turnaround space for emergency vehicles. Roadside vegetation is regularly maintained to support safe and unobstructed evacuation access. <i>Are bridges rated to support emergency equipment?</i> All roadway bridges and culverts are rated to support the weight of emergency response vehicles and equipment. <i>Do gates provide easy access? What gates do you need to open with a key and at what times of the year is the gate locked?</i> All residential and public gates are designed for easy access, with keys and access codes securely stored and maintained in city emergency response vehicles. <i>Can culverts be easily crossed by emergency equipment?</i> Culverts can be easily crossed by emergency equipment.
Structural Ignitability Concerns <i>Provide a comprehensive description of existing conditions that contribute to home ignition due to wildfire:</i> <i>Defensible space is the buffer area established between structures and the grass, trees, shrubs, and the surrounding wildland area.</i> <i>Defensible space slows or stops the spread of wildfire and helps protect homes from catching fire—either from embers, direct flame contact or radiant heat.</i> <i>Proper defensible space provides firefighters a safe area to work in, to defend your home.</i> <i>Defensible space, coupled with home hardening, is essential to improving structure survivability due to wildfire.</i> <i>Description, condition, and general location of at-risk structures:</i>

All infrastructure within Draper City's WUI area is considered at risk for wildfire ignition. The highest-risk structures are located in SunCrest and the areas surrounding Corner Canyon. Homes in these locations are exposed to steep topography, diurnal winds, and dense vegetation, all of which contribute to extreme wildfire behavior. Many residences are adjacent to open space or undeveloped parcels, providing continuous fuel pathways that can carry fire directly toward structures.

Structures within Draper's WUI are required to comply with the Wildland Urban Interface Code of Draper City, which mandates the installation of automatic fire sprinkler systems. In addition, homeowners are encouraged to implement additional home-hardening measures to further reduce wildfire risk.

What percentage of structures have created adequate defensible space? What percentage of structures have received a property assessment?

Approximately 50% of homes in Draper's WUI area have defensible space and approximately 10% have received a property assessment.

Population Concerns

Potentially vulnerable populations may experience difficulty preparing for and responding to wildfire.

In **Draper, Utah**, vulnerable populations include individuals who face significant health risks during prolonged smoke episodes or require specialized assistance during a wildfire evacuation.

High-Risk Populations for Smoke & Air Quality

Prolonged smoke episodes from wildfires pose severe risks to residents with specific health and age-related vulnerabilities:

Individuals with Respiratory and Cardiovascular Conditions: This includes residents with **asthma**, **chronic obstructive pulmonary disease (COPD)**, or **heart disease**, as smoke particulates can exacerbate these conditions and lead to medical emergencies.

- **Children and the Elderly (Ages 65+):** These groups are more susceptible to air pollution; the elderly often have lower physiological reserves to handle smoke-induced stress.
- **Current Smokers:** Approximately **7.1%** of Draper's adult population currently smokes, putting them at potentially higher baseline risk for respiratory distress during smoke events.

Populations with Evacuation Difficulties

Evacuation from high-risk areas like **Suncrest** and **Traverse Mountain**—both categorized as having "**Extreme Risk**" due to vegetation and steep slopes—is challenging for several groups: [10, 11]

- **Residents with Physical Disabilities or Limited Mobility:** Individuals who require wheelchairs or specialized medical equipment may need more time and direct assistance to leave their homes.
- **Those Lacking Personal Transportation:** Residents without access to a private vehicle or those who cannot drive (e.g., some elderly residents or those with certain disabilities) depend on community transport plans.
- **Individuals with Mental Health or Cognitive Limitations:** These residents may face difficulties understanding and following rapid emergency instructions during a high-stress evacuation.
- **Households with Language Barriers:** Residents whose first language is not English may experience delays in receiving or acting upon critical emergency alerts. [2, 4, 12, 13, 14]

Draper City Resources for Vulnerable Residents

Draper offers specific programs to assist vulnerable individuals during emergencies: [15]

- **H.E.L.L.P. (Home Entry Lockbox Loaner Program):** A free service by the [Draper City Fire Department](#) that provides a secure lockbox for a house key, allowing first responders to access residents with special medical needs during an emergency.
- **Special Needs Registry:** Utah residents with functional or access needs can register with Special Needs Utah to help emergency managers identify and assist them during disasters.

Key community values include: Homes and Neighborhoods Houses in foothill communities like Suncrest, Traverse Ridge, and near Corner Canyon are at high risk. Many homes have combustible materials and limited defensible space. Steep terrain and narrow hillside roads can make evacuations challenging during a fire. Infrastructure Highland Drive, Suncrest Drive, and Traverse Ridge Road are main evacuation routes and could be affected by smoke or fire. Power lines and communication systems in the foothills are vulnerable. Water and Watersheds Fires near Draper’s foothills could impact local streams and stormwater systems. Open Space and Recreation The Corner Canyon and Traverse Ridge open-space areas together feature over 100 miles of scenic trails for hiking, biking, and equestrian use, encompassing more than 5,000 acres of open space. Wildfires can lead to trail closures or damage, disrupting recreational activities and impacting community use and tourism. Wildlife Mule deer, elk, coyotes, mountain lions, bobcats, foxes, badgers, skunks, rabbits, squirrels, bats, small rodents, raptors, owls, turkeys, songbirds, quail, grouse, snakes, lizards, toads, and common insects.

Wildfire Risk

Wildfire Risk is a combined assessment of the likelihood of a fire occurring (Threat) and the values of most concern potentially adversely impacted by fire (Fire Effects). Fire Effects consist of the Impacts on Values and Suppression Difficulty.

The Wildfire Threat Index is derived from historical fire occurrence, landscape characteristics including surface fuels and canopy fuels, percentile weather derived from historical weather observations and terrain conditions. [Utah Wildfire Risk Assessment Portal \(UWRAP\)](#)

Encouraging homeowner participation in mitigation activities and neighborhood-level preparedness efforts.

4. Evacuation Planning and Emergency Access

Identifying and improving evacuation routes, secondary access points, and signage in WUI neighborhoods.

Coordinating traffic management and evacuation procedures across jurisdictional boundaries.

Appendix A: Community Wildfire Evacuation Plan

- 1) The on-duty Battalion Chief will be responsible for determining if a wildfire evacuation is needed. This will be done in consultation with the Operations Chief and Emergency Manager, if time and situation allows.
- 2) IPAWS, issued by SLCo Emergency Management, will be used to notify the community. Everbridge will be used internally to notify city personnel.
- 3) The evacuation route will be determined by fire location and includes a North/South direction. This information will be provided within the IPAWS alert.
- 4) Community Connect will be utilized to pre-identify disadvantaged/vulnerable populations that may need assistance during an evacuation. Additionally, these populations will be advised to contact 911 during an incident if they are unable to evacuate on their own so that assistance can be provided by PD/FD resources, if available.

Appendix B: (*Optional) Community Smoke Mitigation Plan

Narrative: This plan will be used by the community to address what strategies can be followed to keep the community safe in the event the air quality downgrades to unhealthy levels due to smoke caused by wildfires.
